Pastor's Page

If one member [of the body] suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.

- 1 Cor. 12:26-27

During this season of Lent we are exploring what it means to continue in the covenant of our baptism. The Rite of Holy Baptism begins with these words that lay out what it means to be baptized:

In baptism our gracious heavenly Father frees us from sin and death by joining us to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are born children of a fallen humanity; by water and the Holy Spirit we are reborn children of God and made members of the church, the body of Christ. Living with Christ and in the communion of saints, we grow in faith, love, and obedience to the will of God. - ELW pg. 227

Everyone who has ever been baptized is a member of God's family and a member of the Church (capitalized because I'm using it to mean the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church). So, we are connected by faith to every believer of every place and time. This kind of membership is sort of like your membership in your family of origin, it is part of who you are by birth (baptism being your birth to new life in Christ).

When a person is baptized, they also become a member of a particular Christian community. When I was baptized, I became a member of Messiah Lutheran Church in Louisville, KY, because that is the congregation where I received the sacrament. Over the years, my congregational membership has transferred many times and each of those congregations has a place in my heart and in the story of my faith journey. Now my membership resides here at Prince of Peace because you have called me to be your pastor and I get the joy of serving among you! This kind of membership is more about record keeping and clarity about where we intend to invest our time and resources.

Being a member of a congregation is a way of saying, "There are many communities of faith, but I am choosing to support and be supported by this one." To exist as a religious organization in the United States of America, there are certain definitions of membership we agree to abide by, which are laid out in our congregational constitution. When we take attendance or review the rolls or request your updated contact information, we do so to ensure accurate records and documentation in accordance with these guidelines.

Later in this newsletter you'll find a list of names of some members of our congregation with whom our office has lost touch. It could be simply that people have moved and changed their phone numbers or e-mail addresses so our ways of staying in contact with them have been lost and we simply need to reconnect. It is possible they have chosen to invest in a different congregation at this time in their lives and haven't told us. If so, we will wish them well and transfer their records to the new congregation, grateful to have had a part in their journey of faith for however long they were here.



**Wade Lawrence shares his "Bee Story" -

The Jubilee Garden Apiary began the year with one overwintered colony, which was soon joined by a new colony in early May. With two colonies, it became necessary to be able to distinguish them in conversation, so the overwintered colony became the U of M hive, and the new colony became the MSU hive. The goal for the MSU hive was to build up in strength to be ready to survive its first Michigan winter. The goal for the U of M hive, having made it through last winter, was to produce a honey crop. Both colonies achieved their respective goals. The MSU colony grew steadily over the summer, steadily gaining weight as the population grew and winter stores were brought in by the workers. The colony went into winter with four brood boxes and weighed about 200 pounds (about 100 of which was food stores). Meanwhile, the U of M colony brought in enough nectar and pollen to sustain it over the coming winter, while also putting up a surplus crop of honey. And in early September, we had a honey harvest event attended by a dozen or so participants who learned the sticky ins and outs of getting honey from the comb and into jars. The bees are now tucked away until spring, but preparations have already begun inside the hives for the coming season. The queens have already begun laying eggs for the next generation of workers, so that when the first nectar and pollen sources begin to appear in



about 6 weeks (!), there will be a workforce ready to hit the ground running -- or flying as the case may be. The way things currently stand, we're looking forward to another successful beekeeping season in 2024.

** WMU Seita Scholars give thanks.

The Seita Scholar program is designed to address the academic gaps and needs that many youth who experience foster care encounter. We support this program through our local benevolence funding. A young Seita Scholar who will graduate this spring said, "The Scholars program is not just a program for me; it is a community that I can call home and family. They have made me feel welcome and that this is a safe place to call home. I am grateful for them believing in me and supporting me to go above and beyond in my college experience."
